FOCUS ON HOW YOU USE WATER

Focus on Watersheds A watershed is the area of land where water—including rainfall—collects and drains into a river, lake or ocean. On the map below, you'll see how land in the Downriver area contains smaller creeks and streams that flow into larger creeks and rivers. These watersheds drain into the Detroit River and Lake Erie.

Focus on Drinking Water

Drinking water for the Downriver area comes from several sources, including Lake Erie and the Detroit River. By keeping harmful pollutants out of runoff that goes into storm drains, Downriver residents can protect the drinking water quality of 126 southeast Michigan communities. This community calendar provides simple household tips

Focus on Runoff Our everyday actions have a direct impact on the quality of regional waterways, large and small. Even a community many miles from a lake or river can pollute it. For instance, excess fertilizer used on a lawn 20 miles away from Lake Erie will wash into a storm drain with rainfall and then flow from local creeks into the lake, where it can cause harmful algae blooms.

FOCUS ON PRESERVING OUR WATERWAYS...TOGETHER!

What We're Doing: Educating Education about water quality is central to the Alliance of Downriver Watersheds' mission. In April of



2021, 23 Green Schools in the Downriver community participated in the Schools for Clean Water Contest. This friendly competition recruited residents to "pledge" and adopt a nearby

storm drain as a way of reducing pollution and trash flow in our local waters.

The competition concluded with 1,235 pledges and 9 Green Schools earning \$5,000 in prize money for educational programming. Chapman Elementary of Rockwood won the \$1,500 grand prize with 371 pledges. Schools are using their

prize money to fund various green initiatives such as school gardens, an outdoor reading garden for special education students, the development of an outside classroom, and beautification of school property.

Other ADW educational programs include mapping of invasive species by local residents, virtual field trips to the University of Michigan's Museum of Natural History for elementary school students, and a volunteer Chemistry and Flow Monitoring program. allianceofdowriverwatersheds.com

Put poisons in their place.

When possible, avoid using toxic household cleaners and chemicals. Also, remember that household cleaners, chemicals, oil, paint and other toxics should never be poured down a sink, into a storm drain or onto the ground. Always dispose of them at a county collection site. In addition to hosting four Household Hazardous Waste Collections per year, Wayne County publishes a Resource Recovery Guide listing facilities that accept household hazardous waste year-round.

Volunteer!



Pick up after your pets.


When left on sidewalks or lawns, pet waste washes directly into storm drains and enters our local waterways in the form of raw, unfiltered sewage. As a pet owner, do your part by scooping, bagging and trashing. It makes for better water quality as well as cleaner sidewalks and happier neighbors.

Put your lawn on a diet.


Prevent the growth of harmful algae in downstream lakes by avoiding phosphorus-based lawn fertilizers, which are restricted under Michigan law. Instead, control weeds and encourage root growth by letting your grass grow to a height of three inches or more. Then use a mulching mower to put back nutrients and organic matter. To find out what would most benefit your particular lawn, consider testing your soil.

Focus on rain gardens—Go native!

Consider creating a beautiful rain garden in a naturally low spot in your yard. Rain gardens use native Michigan plants—like Sand Coreopsis and Black Eyed Susans—that thrive in local conditions while providing habitat for pollinators. With their deep, thirsty roots, these plants capture storm runoff before it has the chance to enter storm drains and pollute our local waterways. To learn more, visit ewashtenaw.org/raingardens

Choose a safe sealant.


Avoid using coal tar sealcoats on your asphalt driveway. Several Southeast Michigan communities have banned their use because they are high in dangerous polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, or PAHs, many of which are hazardous to human health. Instead, choose readily available safer asphalt-based, acrylic or latex alternatives. Learn more from our cooperating partner, HRWC, at: hrwc.org/coaltar.

Clean on the green.

Commercial car washes should always be your first choice, since they're required by law to treat their wastewater. But if you're washing your car at home, park it on the grass. Your lawn will soak up the dirty water, break down the soap, and prevent runoff into the storm drain and nearby waterways.

Plant a tree and reduce runoff.

Tupeday

Consider planting more trees in your yard! They increase your property value and they play a significant role in reducing runoff. Their leaves and bark retain a surprising amount of water—allowing some to evaporate and some to reach the ground more slowly. Depending on size and species, a single tree can store 100 gallons or more. And an urban forest can reduce annual runoff by up to 7 percent.



There's much to be said for mulch. Leaves and grass that make their way into waterways add excess nutrients and use up valuable oxygen as they decompose. But with the help of a mulching mower, leaves and grass clippings can become a natural fertilizer that stays on your lawn, where it belongs. Be sure to keep your yard waste out of the street, where it could wash into nearby waterways through the storm drains.

Don't flush your Rx.

Never flush unused prescription medications. They can pollute local waterways because wastewater treatment plants are not designed to filter out the chemicals. A U.S. Geological Survey study found that 80 percent of sampled streams had detectable levels of compounds found in common medications. Bring your unused medications (for people and pets) to a Drug Take Back program near you.
